"So we have come to know and to believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him." 1 John 4: 16

GOD SLOT

"A third time the Lord called, "Samuel!" And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am; you called me." Then Eli realised that the Lord was calling the boy. So Eli told Samuel, "Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down in his place. The Lord came and, calling as at the other times, "Samuel! Samuel!" Then Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." (1 Samuel 3:8-10) Samuel needed Eli to help him recognise God's call. So often we need others to help us discern God's call, but not only that... there are times when we can be an 'Eli' to others, helping others hear the call of God. Sometimes we avoid asking for help out of fear that it admits failure. We think, 'I should be able to handle this on my own; I'm supposed to succeed. I just need to push through.' But the truth is that God created us with a need for help. Asking for help isn't admitting failure, but recognising the way God made us. Even before the fall, in Garden of Eden, God created Adam to receive provision and help rather than be self-sufficient. On a material level, God provided all of Adam's food, water, even his breath. He provided fellowship for Adam through his own presence. But God also created Adam with a need for help from another person. He created Eve with this purpose in mind: "It is not good for man to be alone; I will make him a helper suitable for him" (Genesis 2:18). God said that his own creation was not complete until he had built in a way for people to give and receive help – even before sin came into the world, it has been God's design for us to need help and give help to each other. This means our need for help is not shameful or equal to failure. God built into us a need for help from the very beginning – and then he immediately began fulfilling that need. Never be afraid to ask for help. God Bless,

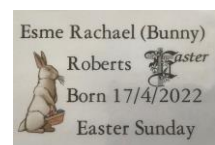

BIKE PROJECT

Our three-month Bike Project has almost come to its end. We have a few more bikes still to give out but this should be complete by next week. Just to recap, we initially started by raising funds and receiving a few donated bikes to give to the Asylum Seekers at St George's Complex and in Polis/Latchi. When Revd Anne Fletcher heard about this, in her role in the Diocese as Community Liaison applied for, and received, a grant from The Episcopal Church of America of €5510 to purchase 35 refurbished bikes plus kit (lights, bell, pump, puncture repair kit, lock, helmet and HiViz jacket). We went into partnership with The Learning Refuge in Paphos and as part of the deal we provided some basic bike maintenance training and basic road safety instruction. A big thank you to the volunteers who helped with this. We have been able to give out 38 bikes due to donations for refreshments and no charge admin work, which meant we could divert that funding towards additional bikes. In addition the bike supplier donated an extra bike, plus any major repairs or problems with the bikes are sorted free of charge. Thanks to everyone for their support for this project, you have really helped with getting people mobile and they can get around for appointments, interviews and to work.
